University of Oklahoma Outreach includes the College of Continuing Education and the College of Liberal Studies.

The College of Continuing Education is a lifelong learning organization dedicated to helping individuals, businesses, groups and communities around the world transform themselves through knowledge.

The College of Liberal Studies seeks to provide the highest quality interdisciplinary education to nontraditional students utilizing its setting within a comprehensive research university to enhance students' skills as lifelong learners, thereby enriching their lives at the personal and professional levels and encouraging them to participate in the work of active citizenship.

Outreach annually offers some 2,000 courses and activities to more than 200,000 nontraditional learners in Oklahoma and in locations all over the world.



Engaged institutions will produce graduates who will be ready to move along a path of self-directed learning and growth. These graduates will understand the connection between what they have learned in the classroom and the strategies that are necessary to apply these concepts to problems they will face in their careers and in their communities. They will be products of “interactive universities” which have developed partnerships with civic, business and political leaders to build better communities.

As you review the stories in this annual report, you will see a number of examples demonstrating how we are in fact “engaged” locally, regionally and even internationally with individuals, businesses and communities.

Within the mission statement of the University of Oklahoma are the words “service to the state and society.” To me, that is what University Outreach at OU is all about. Outreach recently was tapped to be the host of the prestigious and newly formed Confucius Institute at OU. This partnership between China and the university’s Colleges of Arts and Science and Continuing Education has as its core mission the local promotion of Chinese language and culture while supporting Chinese teaching. OU is just one of 80 institutions in 38 countries to serve in this capacity as a home for a Confucius Institute.

The OU College of Continuing Education Center for Business and Economic Development hosted PetroChina Safety Senior Engineers and Executives as part of a new initiative toward establishing a corporate university model that will provide educational solutions across the globe.

Outreach staff members from the InfoPoverty Institute, a unit housed in our Public and Community Services division, led a series of workshops for fish farmers in the United States and several foreign countries to learn more about raising tilapia for economic development. Institute Director John Steffens came up with the idea after traveling in the Caribbean. He saw the potential benefits of aquaculture as a source of economic development.

Another of our program directors, Cynthia Timmons, was invited to Podgorica, a town in Montenegro, Serbia, to share her expertise in helping groups and communities fight drug abuse. During her week in this newly independent country, Timmons conducted a series of presentations and workshops designed to help the local community develop structured and comprehensive drug prevention plans.

Outreach also is involved in a collaborative immersion education program with OU faculty and the Oklahoma City Air Logistics Center at Tinker Air Force Base. The Lean Institute, created by Outreach, is a customized professional education development program through the integration of Lean, SCOR and Six Sigma process improvement principles. The training offered through the Lean Institute is helping to facilitate a base-wide transformation that is taking place at the Air Logistics Center and the Air Force worldwide.

The Economic Development Institute, another division within Outreach, and CETYS University, Baja, Calif., signed a formal agreement to create EDI Mexico. It is the first-ever economic development institute outside the U.S. The agreement was signed by Richard Little, Ed.D., OU associate vice president for Outreach, and Enrique Blancas de la Cruz, president of CETYS University. This new partnership will bring the university’s nationally acclaimed Economic Development Institute to Mexico. These are but just a few of the many programs our innovative directors are developing as

we create meaningful partnerships with businesses, educators and those in the public and social services. It is satisfying that our reach is extending across continents.

Outreach also provides record retention and continuing education credit tracking for the American Association of Architects and the Project Management Institute. Both organizations use more than 150,000 education and training providers worldwide that help the more than 2 million association members maintain licensure and credential requirements.

In FY 2006, our noncredit enrollments were up 15 percent from 2005. That represents a more than 200 percent

increase from 2002. And, the College of Liberal Studies has experienced a more than 400 percent increase in online enrollments since that delivery method was introduced in 2003. This tells me that Outreach continues to innovate and lead the way to apply scholarship and service for the public good.

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




diverse educational offerings

Drawing upon the resources of the state's major, comprehensive research university, Outreach at the University of Oklahoma provides high-quality educational opportunities to both traditional and nontraditional students. Our setting helps us deliver for-credit opportunities, as well as noncredit programs for the community, support in the social services arena and corporate training for working professionals, thereby enhancing their skill sets for career advancement.

Students served through Outreach represent undergraduates in aviation who are the next generation of airline professionals training for jobs in the cockpit, boardroom, control tower and all points in between. Supporting the mission of lifelong learning, Outreach houses programs for senior adults and works to prepare an entire population of children for post-secondary education who otherwise might not be expected to continue formally learning after high school. The following stories showcase our broad spectrum of diverse learning opportunities.

aviation accreditation

flying sooners

On any given afternoon, the air over north Norman often is filled with a ubiquitous light buzzing sound. Look up and that buzz likely can be traced to any number of crimson and cream, single-engine planes sporting an interlocking OU on their tails.

These planes belong to the fleet of the Department of Aviation in the College of Continuing Education. Purchased in FY 2005, these 13 new, single-engine Piper Warrior III airplanes replaced a 30-year-old fleet and are training the nation's future pilots. The fleet also includes Beechcraft Baron and King Air planes for multi-engine and turbine aviation training. Of the 13 Pipers, two are equipped with so-called "glass cockpits," which illustrate gauges, flight instruments and engine elements on two large television-like screens, essential in educating today's pilots.

The department also added a minor in air traffic control to its academic offerings and achieved accreditation for two of its aviation degree programs, making OU the only school in the Big 12 and just the 20th in the nation to achieve this distinction.

According to OU President and Professor Emeritus Richard Van Horn, "OU's program is one of the most intellectually demanding aviation programs in the nation."

senior adult services becomes *Osher Lifelong Learning Institute*

For some three decades, University of Oklahoma Outreach has been dedicated to providing programs for mature adults through Senior Adult Services (SAS). What began as a vision for growth resulted in not only a grant for \$100,000 a year for three years but also in a new name – SAS is now one of 93 Osher Lifelong Learning Institutes (OLLI) nationwide.

The institutes are funded by The Bernard Osher Foundation, a San Francisco-based organization founded in 1977. Found on the campuses of colleges and universities across the country, each of these institutions provides a distinctive array of **courses and activities for seasoned adults who find joy in learning.**

This grant, which requires an application each year to demonstrate progress, will help SAS grow existing program membership and market even more toward the Oklahoma City and Tulsa areas. At the end of the third year, if the OLLI at OU has grown its membership to 500, it is then eligible to become one of nine schools to receive a \$1 million endowment.

For SAS, an organization that recognizes the importance of lifelong learning, the grant will allow the program to better serve the almost 1 million seniors in Oklahoma. “This is going to allow us to grow and expand our programs tremendously,” said Chris Elliott, program development specialist for SAS.



Senior Adult Services to expand with new grant

high tech expectations *providing opportunities to students with disabilities*

One-third of all students with disabilities drop out of school prior to graduation, only 57 percent of youths with disabilities who graduate receive a regular diploma and only 14 percent of youths with disabilities attend post secondary education. These startling statistics motivated Becky Cook, director of the National Center for Disability Education and Training (NCDET) at Outreach, and Rick DeRennaux, director of Tech-Now Inc., Oklahoma High School High Tech program, to join forces to create the Tech-Success project.

Funded by a three-year grant from the National Science Foundation for nearly \$1 million, the project is designed to expose students with disabilities to year-round informal and in-depth learning experiences in IT-intensive subject areas. Students have the chance to visit college campuses and spend time with working professionals at partnering organizations.

The grant illustrates Outreach’s mission to engage with our community by bringing together several of its sectors. Tech-Success’ partners include OU resources such as Sooner Flight Academy and Sam Noble Oklahoma Museum of Natural History, as well as the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration Weather Partners, and the Oklahoma City Zoo and Botanical Garden.

“This project is a win for the kids, a win for the university and definitely a win for Tech-Now Inc.,” DeRennaux said. **“We can do whatever we dream.”**






nontraditional students

With a long history of serving students through distance learning, University of Oklahoma Outreach continues to find innovative ways to broaden its reach to diverse groups of learners including high school students, military personnel and working professionals. Through Outreach it is now possible to earn a high school diploma, a bachelor's and master's degree, as well as a doctorate, online or at a distance.

University of Oklahoma Independent Learning High School is one of only eight university-based high schools in the nation. Students can earn their high school diplomas online or supplement the educational offerings of their traditional brick and mortar schools through OU High School. Distance learning also serves OU students who can conveniently fulfill degree requirements and active duty military personnel preparing for civilian life.

Working adults have found the College of Liberal Studies to be the answer to their learning needs as they are able to continue to work and maintain family commitments while pursuing degrees. Long recognized as a leader in the nontraditional degree movement in continuing liberal studies for adult learners, the college serves students who often are many miles away yet they can earn an OU degree. Outreach provides learning opportunities in a number of nontraditional ways and without regard to geographical boundaries.

his turn at bat

balancing life and a master's degree from the College of Liberal Studies

The Motor City may be 1,070 miles from Norman, but that hardly mattered for Duane McLean, senior vice president of business operations for baseball's Detroit Tigers. McLean, a December 2005 University of Oklahoma graduate, traversed Indiana, Illinois and Missouri over Internet and telephone wires to earn his master's degree in liberal studies.

"I was impressed by how easy it was to complete the program entirely from Detroit," McLean said. "As much as I would have liked to be able to visit, my schedule didn't permit it, but in terms of being able to balance my career, raising a family and continuing my education, it worked out really well."

On his 40th birthday three years ago, while working as senior vice president of business operations for football's Seattle Seahawks, McLean chose to apply to the OU College of Liberal Studies executive leadership program, then took the required exams and submitted his essay. He had done some research online, spoke with college staff, and felt comfortable that OU was an institution from which he would be proud to graduate.

"I treated myself to that birthday present," he said. "I just wanted to do it for myself. I felt it was important, and it was important that I emphasize to my kids that education was important. Regardless of how long it takes, there is always time," he said.

Much of what he learned has informed his career with new opinions and ideas.

"Many of the things that I have learned [and] many of the classes I have taken offer perspective on things that I do everyday in a leadership position," McLean said. "I found something useful [in] every class I have taken that I can apply to my current job."

Along with new skills came a new appreciation for the process of learning, McLean said, maturing from the view he held in his 20's. He enjoyed lessons more and got more out of them than he did when he was younger.

"Everybody has their own reasons for wanting to continue their education," said McLean. "In my case, it wasn't necessarily for economic benefit or career advancement. **I wanted to continue my education for myself because I never had a chance to do that.**"


setting the pace

CLS graduates first sailor afloat

A veteran of 12 submarine deployments serving aboard USS Toledo (SSN 769), Sonar Technician 1st Class David Plouffe became the first sailor to earn a graduate degree through the Navy College Program for Afloat College Education (NCPACE). He earned a master's degree from the College of Liberal Studies. Close to retirement, Plouffe wants to continue passing on his love of learning by becoming a teacher.

University of Oklahoma Outreach, as a charter member of NCPACE, has established a program of independent study courses **designed to both challenge and prepare sailors in their academic pursuits**. The program is administered by the Center for Independent and Distance Learning.

In 1988, the U.S. Navy instituted NCPACE to give sailors the opportunity to experience a college education while on sea duty assignments throughout the world. NCPACE courses are provided by regionally accredited colleges and are offered almost exclusively through CD-ROM format.


jump start

CIDL helps college student start professional life early

Courtney Green is finally living her dream. The University of Oklahoma graduate works full time at the Sam Noble Oklahoma Museum of Natural History, located on the south OU campus. At just 22 years old, Green had been anxious to start her career in the humanities field for quite some time.


While still pursuing her undergraduate degree, she began to experience financial difficulties that fueled her desire to wrap up college and begin her professional life. Needing just six credit hours to complete the requirements for her undergraduate degree in Letters, Green discovered a way to **both finish school and begin her career**.

"I was a senior in college and needed to start working," she said. "But working didn't allow me the time to go to school in the traditional way, so I enrolled in an independent study course, which allowed me to meet my financial needs and finish school." By completing an upper-division journalism course through independent study and earning additional credit through the College Level Examination Program (CLEP), Green finalized her Letters degree in fall 2004 after already beginning her job at the museum.



Courtney Green at work in the Sam Noble Oklahoma Museum of Natural History


"It couldn't have worked out better for me," she said. "I would call it user-friendly."

Committed to improving communities by providing well-equipped and better prepared professionals, Outreach has received numerous grants to expand programming and form international partnerships.

Professional development programs for child care providers work to improve language and literacy skills for preschoolers, and state departments of education benefit from the establishment of the Mid-Continent Regional Comprehensive Center (MC3).

Collaborating with the federal government and industry strengthens our professional relationships within the community, the state, the nation and the world. We provide comprehensive workshops for Tinker Air Force Base personnel, and the postal training center serves as the hub for postal employees across the country to participate in hands-on training. Our ability to deliver training in person, online and at a distance provides our clients with flexibility. Most significantly, the services we provide allow us to engage communities in lifelong learning.





Outreach helps to improve literacy in young learners

improving literacy

CECPD grant pairs preschoolers with mentors

“Literacy affects all of us – the haves and the have-nots. We all suffer when we fail to educate all of our children, regardless of race, gender, ethnicity, disability or socio-economic status.” –Dr. Belinda Biscoe, assistant vice president, Public and Community Services, University of Oklahoma Outreach

Approximately 500 children, predominantly whose first language is Spanish and who have no English skills, 1,000 parents and family members, and more than 70 teachers, staff and administrators have their lives impacted by Outreach’s Center for Early Childhood Professional Development (CECPD). The center’s newest grant, \$3.9 million from the U.S. Department of Education, focuses on professional development for child care providers to improve language and literacy skills for preschoolers, ages 3 and 4.

As one of only 33 funded projects out of an initial pool of approximately 700 applicants, “Starting Right: Early Reading First Oklahoma” will join three similar literacy research grant programs also administered by CECPD.

By entering kindergarten knowing the English alphabet and playing with sounds and words in the English language, and by listening to stories and nursery rhymes, children begin to develop the foundational skills needed to become literate citizens in society.

Through the Starting Right program, children have the opportunity to be paired with literacy mentors—degreed OU employees with strong literacy backgrounds who complete a rigorous interview and training process before they are hired. These mentors help **at-risk children develop important literacy prerequisite skills** and understanding to make the transition to kindergarten easier. In addition, teachers, administrators and paraprofessionals will acquire the knowledge necessary to design and deliver appropriate early literacy instruction, administer assessments and use the data.

consortium for student retention data exchange

helps colleges keep students

Only 57 percent of first-time, full-time, degree-seeking freshmen entering colleges in 1998 graduated within six years from the colleges where they began their college careers. The Consortium for Student Retention Data Exchange (CSRDE), headed by Rosemary Hayes, Ph.D., **helps colleges and universities around the country increase their retention rates.**

CSRDE collects data on approximately 80 percent of all first-time, full-time freshmen attending four-year public institutions in the United States. These data are analyzed by CSRDE staff and compiled into reports used by colleges and universities to benchmark the effectiveness of their retention efforts. CSRDE also studies the retention and graduation of community college transfers into four-year institutions.

Most recently, CSRDE expanded membership to include community colleges and began serving this sector of higher education by administering a survey to track the continuation, completion and transfer rates of students in community colleges. With this information institutions can compare the rates at which their students graduate as compared to similar institutions. CSRDE also provides a forum for faculty, staff and administrators to identify resources and best practices for improving retention.

outreach receives \$11 million grant MC3 supports goals of No Child Left Behind

Public and Community Services in the College of Continuing Education received one of 15 U.S. Department of Education grants to establish a regional Comprehensive Center authorized by Title II of the Educational Technical Assistance Act of 2002. The Comprehensive Centers serve as field agents for the U.S. Department of Education to help state departments of education understand and implement the provisions and purposes of No Child Left Behind and related federal programs. The five-year, \$11 million grant will fund the Mid-Continent Comprehensive Center (MC3).

The center serves the four-state region of Arkansas, Kansas, Missouri and Oklahoma. The Comprehensive Centers have been authorized by Congress to provide technical assistance to state departments of education as states **work to help districts and schools close achievement gaps between and among students** in core content areas and raise achievement in schools, especially those in need of improvement, using proven practices and approaches. Because state departments of education have the primary responsibility for school improvement efforts, the Comprehensive Centers focus their technical assistance efforts on helping states increase their capacity to provide sustained support to districts and schools.

lean institute training

improving efficiency at Tinker Air Force Base

With the long-term goal of becoming America's Air Logistics Center, leaders at Tinker Air Force Base near Midwest City are using Lean initiatives to transform processes at the base. To assist the massive military operation in its effort to function more efficiently, the base contracted Outreach to develop and implement the Lean Institute, a comprehensive training program. This partnership synthesizes the resources of the University of Oklahoma and Outreach to offer customized training solutions for business.

The Lean Institute provides the Tinker workforce with the training and skills necessary to ensure that Tinker continues to be the U.S. Department of Defense leader in efficient, quality support to the U.S. Air Force. It is a collaborative effort between the OU College of Engineering faculty, world class trainers, curriculum and content experts, and other partners, including Rose State College in Midwest City.

The OU team provides training in SCOR, Lean and Six Sigma. Experts from OU, along with its partners, are coaching and training Tinker management and employees through the application of their new skills in the workplace. Courses also are conducted on the Rose State College campus.

"The program was established to provide a focused transformation of the air base's core processes to ensure reliable, timely, cost-effective and quality support to the world-wide expeditionary Air Force," said Major General Terry Gabreski, commander, Oklahoma City Air Logistics Center, Tinker Air Force Base.

During two years of training, the OU team has developed more than 340 workshops and seminars, serving nearly 6,000 participants. Tinker estimates a \$3 million savings due to this training and expects significant savings in the future.

largest contract in campus history

U.S. Postal Service National Center for Employee Development

University of Oklahoma Outreach made history in receiving a U.S. Postal Service contract for the National Center for Employee Development (NCED) that began Jan. 1, 2006. If fully exercised, the contract's total value is more than \$67 million, making it the largest contract award in the history of the OU Norman campus.

The contract awards \$13.5 million for two years with three one-year renewal options. OU Outreach competed with some of the country's largest companies to win the contract, which recognizes Outreach as one of the nation's outstanding managers of personnel services contracts.

NCED is the national technology training and conference center in east Norman for the U.S. Postal Service. The self-contained, living-and-learning center oversees and conducts hands-on technical training for postal employees from across the country who manage and maintain high-technology mail-processing equipment, vehicles, building systems and computer-information networks. The center also delivers and hosts general courses on management and leadership, business-mail management and various programs for both postal and business customers.

OU has administered the personnel contract for the U.S. Postal Service for more than 15 years, during which time unprecedented growth has occurred.

The university has managed an employee base at NCED that has increased more than 175 percent since the initial contract was awarded. The contract employs 217 staff at the Norman NCED facility.

The center began in Norman in 1969 and operated on the top floors of OU's Couch Tower. It offered three training programs for 7,000 students and had a staff of 50.

In FY 2006, the center accommodated more than 228,000 students with 285 courses and 2,865 course offerings. Employees total 610.



National Center for Employee Development in Norman






partnerships and community engagement

Scenic Byways, a partnership between Outreach and Oklahoma Department of Transportation, unites communities across the state by supporting Oklahoma's selected roads, promoting communities and preserving irreplaceable resources.

To help further the role of the College of Liberal Studies, Outreach now serves as publisher of a national journal for students, faculty and alumni of graduate liberal studies programs.

As home to KGOU Radio, Outreach serves both the Norman and Oklahoma City areas with a lively programming schedule combining local news and information with National Public Radio and Public Radio International formats, making KGOU one of the most interesting stations on the air for news and conversation.


partnership preserves state roads

Where else in Oklahoma can you hike through one of the oldest mountain ranges on earth, camp and explore pristine woodlands, or simply drive through prairies on a Sunday afternoon. Oklahoma Scenic Byways offers five inviting trips, each on two-lane and back roads – Talimena National Scenic Byway, Route 66, Wichita Mountains Scenic Byway, the Mountain Pass Scenic Byway and Mountain Gateway Scenic Byway.

Originally developed in 1998, the Oklahoma Scenic Byways program now involves a partnership between the University of Oklahoma Outreach and Oklahoma Department of Transportation. Outreach provides support to the byways communities and nonprofit organizations with improvement projects that promote community and economic development while preserving Oklahoma's irreplaceable resources.

Oklahoma Scenic Byways is part of the National Scenic Byways Program under the U.S. Department of Transportation, Federal Highway Administration. It is a grassroots collaborative effort established to help recognize, preserve and enhance selected roads throughout the U.S.

“Byways can help you learn something about Oklahoma and appreciate our state,” said Pam Lewis, Scenic Byways manager for University of Oklahoma Outreach. **“Oklahoma is filled with natural treasures with remarkable stories to tell.”**




Scenic Byways includes Route 66 in El Reno, Oklahoma

outreach named publisher of journal for Association of Graduate Liberal Studies Programs

A proposal from University of Oklahoma College of Liberal Studies to serve as publisher for *The Journal of the Association of Graduate Liberal Studies Programs* was selected from among other institutions nationwide.

Published in the fall and spring, the journal features nonfiction, fiction and poetry from students, faculty and alumni of graduate liberal studies programs. The fall 2006 edition debuted with a new name and design, thus marking a new personality for a publication distributed since 1995.

The idea of changing the journal's name and design first appeared in the Outreach proposal submitted to the AGLSP board, which won Outreach publishing responsibilities of the journal. The first OU-produced issue of the journal

was in fall 2005, which was published under the original name, *The Journal of Graduate Liberal Studies*, and design. *Confluence* is the new name for the journal, chosen from more than 50 suggested titles for the publication.

kgou radio move triples work space

It's been 24 years since KGOU Radio has undergone a major renovation. The full-service public radio station, operated by University of Oklahoma Outreach, serves the greater Oklahoma City metropolitan area with a news/talk/jazz format, utilizing programs from National Public Radio, Public Radio International and others. The staff, comprised of nine full-time members and five part-time members, has shared computers and desks with no room to hire any more personnel or acquire any more equipment.

Fortunately, following the construction of a new journalism building on the OU-Norman campus, the third floor of Copeland Hall became free and plans for KGOU Radio's new home swung into motion.

The new space includes a 20-foot-x-32-foot production room, a vast improvement from the 10-foot-x-10-foot room in the old location. KGOU Radio was also able to double the number of editing booths to accommodate both students and full-time staff.

The new production room controls the performance area with two different kinds of audio consoles: one regular console good for recording panel discussions, and a multi-track board, which is professional grade for music recording.

As the station settles in to its new home, station management anticipates the audience seeing incremental, but regular, improvements and additions to the program's schedule of local content.

"Everything is wonderful – the clean surroundings and the staff actually has space to sit," said Karen Holp, KGOU Radio general manager. "It's been a dream for so long to move out of the old place. I'm so excited."






Transformation. The staff of Outreach works to help individuals, groups and organizations transform themselves through knowledge, and they live this organizational mission themselves. Many of the more than 1,000 employees of Outreach worldwide are engaged in some form of educational transformation either through university degree programs or professional certification. The vice president's office makes available scholarship funds for Outreach staff members in support of these educational goals.

The talents of Outreach leaders are recognized by national board appointments. James P. Pappas, Ph.D., vice president for University of Oklahoma Outreach and dean of the College of Liberal Studies, was the 2006 recipient of the prestigious Julius M. Nolte Award for Extraordinary Leadership presented by the University Continuing Education Association. The award honors unusual and extraordinary contributions to continuing education on the regional, national, and/or international level.

During his 40-year career, Pappas has been a distinguished administrator, researcher and teacher in continuing and higher education. Indeed, this annual report is a reflection of his skills. As a result of his leadership, grant expenditures for the OU College of Continuing Education have increased from \$14.7 million in FY 1994 to \$58.3 million in FY 2004. His guidance led to the \$67 million renewal of the U.S. Postal Service training contract, Federal Aviation Administration air traffic control training contract, Tinker Air Force Base Lean Institute and Invest Ed™ investor education project with the Oklahoma Department of Securities.

“This award recognizes what we have long known at the University of Oklahoma about the stature of Jim Pappas as one of the most outstanding educators in the field of continuing education in the nation,” said OU President David L. Boren. **“Jim Pappas has made a lasting contribution to our university and to the people of Oklahoma.”**

The award honors the memory of Julius M. Nolte, a pioneer in the field of continuing higher education. Previous recipients of the prestigious award include Michael Shinagel of Harvard University, Alexander N. Charters from Syracuse University and Robert Senecal of the University of Kansas.

Pappas earned bachelor’s and master’s degrees from the University of Ohio and his doctorate from Purdue University and joined OU in 1987.















college of liberal studies graduates, FY 2006


